

Shirley Kline January 13th 1930 - July 22nd, 2020

Shirley grew up among relatives in the German community in Cincinnati. The family helped to found Martini Evangelical Reformed Church.



Shirley, her parents, and her grandparents attended church every week. Her grandfather started out delivering hardware in a wheelbarrow in Cincinnati Ohio. He was

smart and a hard worker. Eventually he owned his own hardware store. It was an absolutely dream of a hardware store. After he died Shirley's mother Margaret ran the store. Just before World War II Shirley's mother asked Shirley to order a dozen saws. Shirley by accident ordered 12 dozen. The net result was that Fries hardware had hand saws during World War II, when no one else had saws. Shirley was always lucky.

Shirley was an only child, a hard worker and perfections. She received a full scholarship to Wellesley where she got her first B instead of her usual A.

She decided to take a few years off and worked as a lab technician at Cincinnati General Hospital. While working in the lab she met her husband Frank. They were married over 67 years. It was a good marriage and two outstanding children were part of the result. July 2019 She was active in PTA and an avid equestrian. She owned and rode horses until she was in her 70s.

Shirley read music and was a fine choral singer. Later she sang in the St. Luke's choir. She was an exceptional seamstress. She made her own clothes and made shirts for Frank. She was a fine quilter and a member of the South Bay Quilting Society.

She made friends that she kept for a lifetime.



Shirley founded, with Joe Lehman, The Palos Verdes Horseman's Association. She was their 1st president.

She was organized and disciplined and expected others to be the same. She was also an extremely kind and loving person once you got past the German perfectionist veneer.

Shirley and Frank have been members of St. Luke's Presbyterian Church for over 30 years. Shirley was at one time or another, a deacon, a member of the mission commission and she ran the program to make casseroles for the indigent and homeless.

Shirley is missed in the Lanes. Rest in peace.

Forth of July in the Lanes

In 2009 a few families in the Lanes did their own little parade just for fun. Then in 2010, we brought the idea to the HOA Board and got the Parade approved as an official event!

COYOTE HAZING

The sound of coyotes howling and yipping at night sometimes causes people concern and alarm. Some mistakenly believe howling /yipping indicates that a group of coyotes has made a kill.



While coyotes howl for a variety of reasons, it is not likely because they have downed prey. Doing so would draw attention and might attract competing coyotes or other predators to their location, which is not something a hungry coyote would want to do. Coyotes howl and yip primarily to communicate with each other

and establish territory. So despite those blood curdling sounds at night – nothing is being killed or eaten.

<u>Here are some general rules to follow to keep</u> your property safe from coyotes:

• Avoid feeding pets outside. If you must, feed them only for a set time during the day (for no more than one hour) and remove the food bowl as soon as your pet has finished their meal.

• In dry conditions, water can be as alluring as food, so remove water bowls set outside for pets and empty watering cans.

• If you compost, use enclosed bins and never compost meat or fish scraps.

• Good housekeeping, such as regularly raking areas around bird feeders, can also help discourage coyote activity near homes.

• Remove fallen fruit from the ground.

• Keep trash in high-quality containers with tightfitting lids. Only place the cans curbside the morning of collection. If you leave them out overnight, they are more likely to be tipped and broken into.

Hazing tips:

If you encounter a coyote on our trails of street, the simplest method of hazing a coyote involves being loud and large: Stand tall, wave your arms, and yell at the coyote, approaching them if necessary, until they run away. If a coyote has not been hazed before, they may not immediately run away when you yell at them. Do not stop until the coyote has left the area or you risk teaching the coyote that your hazing behavior is "normal," and is nothing to be concerned about.



• Hazing is most effective when an individual coyote is hazed by a variety of people using a variety of techniques.

• A coyote that is being hazed must be able to recognize that the potential threat is coming from a person. Therefore, hiding behind a bush and throwing rocks or hazing from inside your car isn't effective.

- You can use hazing techniques and tools for one animal or multiple animals. There is usually a dominant animal in the group who will respond, and others will follow her lead.
- Don't stop hazing after it's successful. Coyotes & pups could return to their unacceptable habits or behaviors if you stop.

• Share this information by teaching your family, friends, and neighbors how to haze coyotes too! The more people that get involved

in hazing, the more quickly you will see results.
